Sunlit waters near the ocean surface produce large amounts of organic material through photosynthesis. Some of it is eaten near the surface, but dead cells, waste and fragments stick together and begin to sink as 'marine snow'. As these particles descend, microbes and animals (17)---- much of their carbon, returning it to the water as dissolved compounds or carbon dioxide. Early mechanical clocks stored energy in a suspended weight. A train of gears transferred this energy to the hands, but without a regulator the weight would fall too quickly. The escapement solved the problem by alternately locking and releasing the gear train. Each release allowed a wheel to advance (22)---- a small step and delivered an impulse to an oscillator. In early clocks, the oscillator was a horizontal bar called a foliot. Later, the pendulum improved accuracy because its period was more regular. Even so, temperature changes could alter its length, and friction (23)---- energy from each swing. Clockmakers developed new materials, lubricants and compensation mechanisms to reduce these effects. A successful escapement had to be efficient enough to keep the oscillator moving (24)---- gentle enough not to disturb its natural rhythm. Geckos can run across ceilings not because their toes contain glue but because each toe is covered with millions of microscopic hairs called setae. Each seta branches into even smaller tips, increasing the area in contact with a surface. When these tips approach a material closely, weak molecular attractions known as van der Waals forces become significant in combination. The adhesive effect is directional: a gecko loads the setae by pulling its toes in one direction and detaches them rapidly by changing the angle and peeling from the surface. This allows strong attachment without sticky residue.

Engineers have developed dry adhesives inspired by this mechanism. Potential uses include climbing robots, reusable fasteners and grippers that handle delicate components in clean rooms. Yet copying a biological structure at a useful scale is difficult. Synthetic fibres may wear down, become contaminated or perform poorly on rough, wet or dusty surfaces. A design that maximises initial grip may also be hard to release or costly to manufacture. Some researchers therefore focus on matching the gecko's combination of controllable attachment, self-cleaning and durability rather than reproducing every detail. The term 'gecko-inspired' is thus more accurate than 'gecko-copying': engineering success depends on adapting the principle to a particular task and environment.

Language nests are immersion programmes in which young children spend much of the day hearing and using an endangered language, often with fluent elders and trained caregivers. The model seeks to restore intergenerational transmission at a point when many parents understand the heritage language but no longer speak it confidently to their children. Songs, games, meals and routines provide repeated contexts in which the language is used for real purposes rather than taught as isolated vocabulary.

A language nest can create new speakers, but preschool alone cannot reverse language shift. Children need opportunities to continue using the language in primary school, at home and in the community. Otherwise, they may associate it with a single classroom and switch to the dominant language elsewhere. Programmes also face shortages of fluent staff, teaching materials and stable funding. Elders may possess rich linguistic knowledge but require support in adapting it to early-childhood settings, while younger caregivers may need intensive language training.

For these reasons, success is not measured solely by enrolment or test scores. Communities may also examine whether families increase use at home, whether public events create new domains for the language and whether graduates continue learning as they grow. Language nests are most effective when they are one part of a broader strategy that gives the language social value and practical space.

Buildings and industrial processes often need heat at a different time from when it is available. Phase-change materials (PCMs) address this mismatch by storing thermal energy as they melt and releasing it as they solidify. During the change of phase, a material can absorb a relatively large amount of heat while its temperature changes only slightly. This is called latent heat storage. A PCM embedded in a wall, for example, may melt during a warm afternoon and solidify at night, reducing peak indoor temperatures. Similar systems can help keep medicines or food within a narrow temperature range during transport.

Choosing a suitable PCM requires more than finding a material with high storage capacity. Its melting point must match the intended operating temperature, and it must remain stable through many cycles. Some materials expand, leak, corrode containers or separate into components after repeated melting. Encapsulation can isolate the PCM, but it adds cost and may slow heat transfer. Low thermal conductivity is another limitation: if heat cannot move through the material quickly, much of its theoretical capacity may not be used during a short charging period.

PCMs do not replace insulation. Insulation slows heat flow; a PCM temporarily absorbs and later releases heat. Effective designs often combine the two and consider weight, fire safety, maintenance and local climate.

Smell is a powerful element of experience, yet it leaves a weak archaeological record. A room's colours may survive in paint fragments and its sounds may be inferred from its shape, but an odour usually disappears when volatile molecules disperse. Researchers who reconstruct historical scents therefore work with indirect evidence. They analyse residues in containers, identify plant or animal materials in recipes, trace commodities in trade records and read descriptions of workshops, streets or rituals. Chemical analysis may reveal compounds once present, but it rarely supplies a complete formula.

Reconstruction also involves interpretation. A historical ingredient may no longer be available, may have changed through cultivation or may now be considered unsafe. Moreover, people learn to classify smells through culture and personal experience; an odour described as clean or medicinal in one period may seem unpleasant to modern visitors. Museums must therefore decide whether to reproduce a plausible material mixture, evoke a documented association or simply invite visitors to compare descriptions.

Responsible projects present reconstructed scents as hypotheses rather than exact recoveries. They document substitutions, control exposure for visitors with sensitivities and explain which parts are based on chemical evidence and which on historical judgement. Used in this way, scent can add a neglected dimension to interpretation without pretending that the past has been restored unchanged.
